Dear Parishioners and Friends of All Saints, Boyne Hill,

On Sunday two young members of our Young Person's Confirmation course brought forward a bag containing items that showed the watching congregation that they were very much aware of the climate crisis issues the world faces. Tim and Ned highlighted through a well-used and obviously much loved, second hand toy animal that we can re-use gifts. This toy that they had purchased from a charity shop provided Tim and Ned with joy having previously been owned by another child.

Other items that were draw out of the reuseable bag included a water bottle that can be refilled instead of using plastic bottles, a portion of broccoli that reminded us that alongside King Charles we can have 2-3 meat free days in the week. I believe Tim and Ned's family wait until the weekend to enjoy a treat of a meat-based meal. The young people will make a presentation at the Confirmation service showing how they are taking seriously the challenges we face in looking after the world God has given us.

Those that have picked up a copy of 'Pathways' the Diocesan Newsletter will note that on page 17 we can find ways to save water, reduce plastic, eat sustainably, reduce food waste, recycle everything at zerowasteboxes.terracycle.co.uk and think about travel sustainability and home heating. Tim and Ned were going to join me in turning off the lights in church during the service to show saving electric. According to the article in 'Pathways' more than 60% of the change required to get to net zero involves personal behavioural change by individuals and communities in the areas of transport, home heating and diet.

The Bishop of Reading, will on the day of the confirmation, be asking the candidates a question of faith concerned with the fifth mark of mission of the Church of England to seek ways in which we might work in partnership with God in protecting creation. The Diocese of Oxford has declared a climate emergency. The PCC of All Saints are seeking to word a document that can be placed on the Web Page supporting this statement. One of the challenging elements of the motion is that which asks Anglican leaders and all Christians to support the poorest in the world who are suffering the most from the impacts of climate change.

This leads us to the course that was planned by Jenny Wilks and Jo McMullen called 'Tenants of the King' a study course inspired by the charity 'Operation Noah'. Over breakfast a small but thoughtful group of people have discussed what our identity is as 'Tenants in God's Land', to see God's broken world and still believe God has a plan to save, to find ways to play our part in working in partnership with God and creation and finally to speak up and challenge governments when we believe it right to do so. The basis for the final

discussion was based on Romans 13: 1-7. A quote was given that suggested 'Historically war, genocide, and slavery have come not from disobedience but obedience.' Is it ever right to challenge the system?

Romans 13 was seen as a way in which God gives political leaders authority. For example verses 4-5 maintenance of law and justice, collecting taxes and that they were to be servant leaders (Diakonoi) . If you like political leaders were as far as Paul is concerned close to church leaders and Jesus himself as seeking to serve rather than to be served. Clearly you need governments, and no one desires to live in a lawless society but there may be occasions in life when you challenge where you see the need 'to protect citizens from harm and to secure the future for generations to come' — Rowan Williams.

Some questions you may want to reflect upon are 'Is there a place for Christians to engage in local and or/ national politics in order to promote creation care? Should Christians see climate justice for our global neighbours as a priority? Another quote to finish on from Martin Luther King 'The Church is the Conscience of the State'. At the very least these are questions we need to pray about and discern what God is calling us to do.

EPISTLE 2 Timothy 3: 14 — 4: 5

Continue in what you have learned and firmly believed, knowing from whom you learned it, and how from childhood you have known the sacred writings that are able to instruct you for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. All scripture is inspired by God and is useful for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, so that everyone who belongs to God may be proficient, equipped for every good work. In the presence of God and of Christ Jesus, who is to judge the living and the dead, and in view of his appearing and his kingdom, I solemnly urge you: proclaim the message; be persistent whether the time is favourable or unfavourable; convince, rebuke, and encourage, with the utmost patience in teaching. For the time is coming when people will not put up with sound doctrine, but having itching ears, they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own desires, and will turn away from listening to the truth and wander away to myths. As for you, always be sober, endure suffering, do the work of an evangelist, carry out your ministry fully.

Jesus told his disciples a parable about their need to pray always and not to lose heart. He said, 'In a certain city there was a judge who neither feared God nor had respect for people. In that city there was a widow who kept coming to him and saying, "Grant me justice against my opponent." For a while he refused; but later he said to himself, "Though I have no fear of God and no respect for anyone, yet because this widow keeps bothering me, I will grant her justice, so that she may not wear me out by continually coming." And the Lord said, 'Listen to what the unjust judge says. And will not God grant justice to his chosen ones who cry to him day and night? Will he delay long in helping them? I tell you, he will quickly grant justice to them. And yet, when the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on earth?'
