

Dear Parishioners and Friends of All Saints, Boyne Hill,

I write this newsletter trying to keep cool on the day that could be the hottest recorded in the UK since records began. For some people, I have read that it has reminded them of the summer of 1976. Although the highest temperature was in the mid 30's (not as extreme as expected today) I do recall the two months of continual hot and dry weather that year brought. I recall having to walk up the hill outside our house in The Uplands in Rogerstone, near Newport to pump water for our use. That said most of my memories of that summer are pleasant ones.

Those memories take me back to hours and hours of playing cricket, football, and tennis on the welfare grounds in Rogerstone with my friends. Tim my brother and I would be staying with my grandparents with my mother working at the South Wales Electricity Board. Early in the morning we would set off to play sport and every half hour or so cooling down eating 'Tip Tops' (Does anyone remember them?) The morning would flash by as we pretended to be one of the great West Indian cricketers who were thrashing England that summer. (My mother even took us to Lords to see England v West Indies and the great Viv Richards et all) I recall Bjorn Borg playing unbelievable tennis at Wimbledon and then diving round the grass courts at Rogerstone trying to emulate his top spin forehands down the line. They were happy days, but on the horizon, changes were ahead for me.

In September of that year, I would begin at a new school at Bassaleg Comprehensive. This school had 1200 (Now close to 2000) students and I was leaving my lovely little Junior School where I had been taught my times tables via football style knock out competitions with the wonderful Bob Sully. Bob who died in the last 12 months was a brilliant, enthusiastic teacher who coached our football team. We reached the Town Final losing 3-1 after extra time before winning the Valley's Cup. This was quite an achievement for a small school.

I arrived at Bassaleg to be informed that there was no football at this school. We were proud Welshmen and played rugby. Football was for softies! I tried whispering that my team Leeds were very good at kicking people as well as the ball, but no one listened! This was only part of the problem. Having to learn so many new subjects including learning languages like French and for goodness sake Welsh! Not only that but how would I cope in a school with so many new faces and new teachers?

This was my starting point this week as I spoke to the leavers service of All Saints School. I told them about the story of Joshua and Caleb the two wonderful spies sent by Moses to view the Promised Land. The people had survived slavery in Egypt, but God wanted them to know that they were loved and should live life with dignity. When they struggled to find food in the wilderness and then were informed by 10 other spies that the Promised Land was filled with giants they were really cheesed off! I knew the feeling when I was told as a 6

stone weakling to tackle this 12 stone, muscle bound thug on the rugby field at Bassaleg! Slowly of course I met new friends (Simon, Mark and John are friends to this day), watched Wales win grand slams and started to try and learn a subject or two at school though never mastering Welsh.

Joshua and Caleb did convince the people that the Promised Land held good prospects and they the people should face change with confidence that God was with them. I asked the children what would they miss at school? Some a favourite teacher, some their best friends as they would be going to different senior schools, some the comfy benches that Furze Platt apparently do not provide! Some were worried and anxious about the size of their new school, but they all seemed more confident than I had been at their age.

We discussed the idea of change and the fact that they had learned from their teachers, made great friends, and would take these experiences into the next stage of their education. Even the girl who was upset that she would not be given a lift to school but would have to walk, reflected with half a smile when I pointed out the weather and how she might be playing her part in helping the planet.

We are blessed at All Saints with the opportunities we have to share the educational journey of children in our parish. It's great that we have shared 14 years of Open the Book, assemblies, classes at church and Christmas services with our schools. We celebrate too our governors in our church schools as we follow George Street's example of education of the young when he built the school in the Quadrangle all those years ago. Last week Sue Wright and I had the joy of seeing Altwood School welcome one of our Iranian friends, Zoe, to begin A levels in September. Zoe who has travelled to a new country, learned a new language, and is thrilled at the chance of discovering a new opportunity to continue her education and know that she is valued and loved by God. Zoe (Zoha) is highlighting what real change might be.

WORSHIP FOR SUNDAY 24 JULY THE SIXTH SUNDAY AFTER TRINITY

COLLECT

Merciful God, you have prepared for those who love you such good things as pass our understanding: pour into our hearts such love towards you that we, loving you in all things and above all things, may obtain your promises, which exceed all that we can desire; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

EPISTLE Colossians 2: 6 -15

Brothers and sisters, as you have received Christ Jesus the Lord, continue to live your lives in him, rooted and built up in him and established in the faith just as you were taught, abounding in thanksgiving. See to it that no one takes you captive through philosophy and empty deceit, according to human tradition, according to the elemental spirits of the universe, and not according to Christ. For in him the whole fullness of deity dwells bodily, and you have come to fullness in him, who is the head of every ruler and authority. In him also you were circumcised with a spiritual circumcision, by putting off the body of the flesh in the circumcision of Christ; when you were buried with him in baptism, you were also raised with him through faith in the power of God, who raised him from the dead. And when you were dead in trespasses and the uncircumcision of your flesh, God made you alive together with him, when he forgave us all our trespasses, erasing the record that stood against us with its legal demands. He set this aside, nailing it to the cross. He disarmed the rulers and authorities and made a public example of them, triumphing over them in it.

GOSPEL Luke 12: 13 – 21

Jesus was praying in a certain place, and after he had finished, one of his disciples said to him, 'Lord, teach us to pray, as John taught his disciples.' He said to them, 'When you pray, say: Father, hallowed be your name. Your kingdom come. Give us each day our daily bread. And forgive us our sins, for we ourselves forgive everyone indebted to us. And do not bring us to the time of trial.' And he said to them, 'Suppose one of you has a friend, and you go to him at midnight and say to him, "Friend, lend me three loaves of bread; for a friend of mine has arrived, and I have nothing to set before him." And he answers from within, "Do not bother me; the door has already been locked, and my children are with me in bed; I cannot get up and give you anything." I tell you, even though he will not get up and give him anything because he is his friend, at least because of his persistence he will get up and give him whatever he needs. So I say to you, Ask, and it will be given to you; search, and you will find; knock, and for everyone who knocks, the door will be opened. Is there anyone among you who, if your child asks for a fish, will give a snake instead of a fish? Or if the child asks for an egg, will give a scorpion? If you then, who are evil, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will the heavenly Father give the Holy Spirit to those who ask him!'
